


A massive fire raged through a downtown Los Angeles textile building early Friday, sending towering flames and plumes of smoke high into the air. It took 120 firefighters more than four hours to get the blaze under control, leaving the building a total loss but fortunately resulting in no injuries. The blaze began shortly after 5 a.m. at the building, described as a family-owned textile business, in the 1400 block of South Main Street. Firefighters on scene initially took an aggressive approach, entering the building and positioning on the roof to fight the flames. But they soon had to pull back into defensive mode for safety, remaining on the exterior as flames consumed the building and eventually the roof collapsed. ABC7/LAFD Los Angeles Firefighters Extinguish Vermont Vista Home Blaze in 13 Minutes, Two Adults Rescued Earlier today, flames engulfed a single-family home in Vermont Vista, prompting a swift response from the Los Angeles Fire Department. The incident, designated INC#0422, took place at 650 W 111th Place and was first reported at 8:20 AM. Moderate smoke was seen billowing from the one-story dwelling as firefighters geared up to tackle the blaze, according to the LAFD. Reports indicate that there were patients


inside the residence when the LAFD arrived on scene. Crews entered the building in offensive mode, fighting the fire that seemed to have concentrated in a room towards the rear of the home. The quick and decisive actions of the firefighters resulted in a "knockdown" of the fire in just 13 minutes, as per the LAFD. Firefighters Put out Flames in Vermont Knolls House It took firefighters 27 minutes to put out a stubborn fire in a house in the Vermont Knolls area of South Los Angeles, authorities said Monday. The fire was reported at 11:25 p.m. Sunday inside a 1,400-square-foot house at 502 W. 77th St., according to the Los Angeles Fire DepartmentÖs Brian Humphrey. The fire was out at 11:52 p.m. Firefighters rescued two uninjured dogs from the fire, Owhich was fueled by excessive personal storage within the structure, O Humphrey said. No injuries were reported but at least three people were displaced and were receiving placement assistance from the American Red Cross, he said. **MvNewsLA** 

Los Angeles Firefighters Quickly Extinguish Blazing Garages, **Safeguard South Park Homes** Flames ripped through a row of garages in South Park, but skilled firefighters worked swiftly to protect nearby homes. The Los Angeles Fire Department reported a fire at 9:09 PM on April 10 at 336 W 50th Street, where at least four garages were engulfed in heavy fire directly behind two residential fourplexes. These buildings were in danger, prompting an immediate response from Fire Station 46, Battalion 13, and other units from the South Bureau, according to the LAFD. The firefighting battalion's response was both rapid and effective, as they aggressively worked to protect the imperiled structures. The crews managed to, within a mere 27 minutes, access the heart of the inferno, confine it, and thoroughly extinguish the flames, thus preventing what could have potentially become a more catastrophic event, as reported by the LAFD. **Hoodline**

MAN KILLED IN FORKLIFT ACCIDENT

Worker killed after getting stuck underneath forklift in Bel Air A man was killed after he was trapped underneath a toppled forklift in Bel Air on Monday. Los Angeles Fire Department crews were sent to the scene, in the 900 block of N. Moraga Drive, at around 1:30 p.m. after learning of the incident, according to a statement. They say that the worker, an adult male, was trapped underneath the forklift as it was carrying steel rebar at a construction site. Firefighters attempted to render medical aid but the man was pronounced dead at the scene. On Tuesday, he was identified as 42-year-old Tony Gallegos by the Los Angeles Department of Medical Examiner.

**Individual Fatally Struck by Metro Train at** Westlake/Macarthur Park Station in Los Angeles A fatal accident occurred on Friday at a Westlake/MacArthur Park Metro rail station in Los Angeles when an individual was struck and killed by a Metro train after falling onto the tracks, authorities reported. The Los Angeles Fire Department (LAFD) arrived on the scene at around 9:13 PM to discover that a pedestrian had been fatally struck by a train. Firefighters coordinated with the Los Angeles Police Department (LAPD) and the Medical Examiner to handle the body recovery, as detailed in an LAFD alert. **Hoodline** 

LAFD Rescues Individual from Trapped Vehicle On Sunday, April 7, the Los Angeles Fire Department disclosed they rescued an individual in Griffith Park after an accident. The incident was reported at 5:47 a.m. on the northbound 5 freeway. A solo vehicle with two persons trapped in the vehicle, one of whom (undetermined age/gender) was deceased. The other patient (undetermined age/gender) was disentangled from the wreckage by firefighters and has been taken to a regional trauma center in critical condition. No other injuries were reported. The name of the deceased has not been disclosed to the public. The vehicle was found by the California Highway Patrol on the right shoulder with heavy damage. **Canyon News**

INJURED IN BOAT FIRE SAN PEDRO **Boat fire in San Pedro near Port of Los Angeles leaves 2 with** minor injuries Two people suffered minor injuries following a boat fire Thursday in San Pedro, authorities said. Firefighters responded to Berth 42 in the Port of Los Angeles area just before 2 p.m. after receiving reports of a 40-foot pleasure boat on fire. When they arrived, they saw heavy smoke coming from the boat. Video posted on the Citizen app showed clouds of black smoke in the distance. "Firefighters initiated marine firefighting tactics and extinguished the flames in 20 minutes, protecting the other nearby vessels," said the fire department in a statement. Los Angeles Firefighters Extinguish Granada Hills Blaze in 13 Minutes, One Injured Early this morning, Los Angeles firefighters faced a raging inferno as they battled a second-floor blaze in a Granada Hills residence. The fire erupted at 11256 N Paso Robles Avenue where crews quickly went to work, attacking the fire from inside the home and cutting through the roof to release heat and smoke, according to the Los Angeles Fire Department. The LAFD reported that it took 36 firefighters just 13 minutes to snuff out the flames, after responding to the scene shortly before 5 a.m., one adult male with burn injuries was treated at the scene before being whisked away by paramedics to a local hospital their efforts were hampered not by a lack of courage, but by the blaze's stubborn refusal to yield.

Los Angeles Fire Department Contains Refrigerant Leak at **Hollywood Office Building** A chemical scare occurred this morning in Hollywood when a refrigerant leak was discovered at an office building located at 1575 N Gower St. The Los Angeles Fire Department was called to the scene at approximately 10:47 AM to address the situation. Firefighters arrived promptly to contain the hazard. according to their LAFD. The leak sprung during maintenance work on an air conditioning system, as reported by the Los Angeles Fire Department. Although the chemical released is not considered toxic when inhaled, the real danger lies in its potential to displace oxygen, which can present a significant hazard, particularly in enclosed spaces.

LAFD Successfully Contains Natural Gas Leak at Lincoln **Heights Sanitation Yard in Los Angeles** Emergency responders quickly contained a hazardous leak at a Lincoln Heights sanitation yard late last night. According to the Los Angeles Fire Department, firefighters were called to 452 N San Fernando Rd at approximately 11:30 PM after a liquid natural gas tank was reported to be leaking. The LAFD alert described how crews worked to isolate the danger area, preventing entry to ensure public safety. Specialists were soon on the scene to assess the situation and determine a response. The incident, logged under INC#1676, drew considerable attention from local residents and authorities alike. Today's follow-up revealed that LAFD's Hazardous Materials Specialists managed to quickly identify and stop the leak earlier this morning. Hoodline

The LAFD Ground and Air Response assisted an adult male hiker with an apparent ankle fracture, on the Lower Trebek Trail east of Nichols Canyon Road in the Santa Monica Mountains. The patient was hoisted aboard a hovering LAFD rescue helicopter in fair condition and will receive continuing in-flight care from LAFD Flight Paramedics during direct helicopter transport to a regional trauma center for treatment. **Canyon News** 

Female Hiker Rescued by LAFD Air Operations in Chatsworth After Distress Call A hiker in need of rescue was airlifted to safety by the Los Angeles Fire Department in Chatsworth on Wednesday after suffering an incident in rugged terrain. The Department conducted the rescue operation following a distress call that came in earlier that day. A woman, stranded and unable to make her way out after an undisclosed injury or medical issue, was swiftly located by firefighters in a remote area near Jeffrey Mark Court, according to the LAFD. OHe got out of his vehicle, likely to assess the situation and render aid to anyone in need, when he was hit by another vehicle, Ó fire department spokesman Erik Scott said in a videotaped statement posted on X, formerly Twitter. Despite the efforts of emergency responders, including the fire department, Fuerte was pronounced dead at the scene. OWe extend our heartfelt sympathy to the immediate family, friends and loved ones during this incredibly difficult time, Ó said Scott.
